Therefore, vasa is critical for sexual reproduction and is required from one generation to the next. Consequently, the vasa gene is highly conserved through evolution as it is passed from mother to offspring. Restraint and seclusion historically have been utilized to control mal-adaptive behaviors. Over the past decade the practice of restraint and seclusion has increased in educational settings as has the scrutiny of its use. As risks and results of restraint to include death, physical injuries, and emotional trauma have been brought to the public's attention so has the concern surrounding the lack of governance. The purpose of this research is to investigate the use of physical restraint and seclusion in educational settings to include policies and practices across the United States and in China. Results revealed that there is a need for the use of restraint and seclusion however, due to the lack of clear policies and practice guidelines children in the United States and abroad are at continued risk of serious injury and or death.
